38% of the class report speaking a language other than English at either an advanced or fluent level, including 18 different languages. 24% come from backgrounds traditionally considered underrepresented in medicine, and 12% are first generation college degree graduates.

40% of MD28 come directly from their undergraduate years, 24% took a gap year, and 36% graduated two years ago or more. 10 incoming students have already completed advanced degrees. Many have authored published research and worked at the NIH and other research centers. Five have served in the U.S Military. Others have completed significant work as EMTs and CNAs, and many have volunteered with numerous organizations such as The Red Cross, Habitat for Humanity, Global Brigades, and clinics and community outreach programs in the United States and abroad. All have demonstrated a deep commitment to medicine and to the characteristics Brown University values: humanism, compassion, and the intention to lead lives of purpose and integrity.
