40% of the class report speaking a language other than English at either an advanced or fluent level, including 22 different languages.

43% of MD30 come directly from their undergraduate years, 20% took a gap year, and 37% graduated two years ago or more. 11 incoming students have already completed advanced degrees.

Many have authored published research and worked at the NIH and other research centers. We have Fulbright scholars, Cope Health Scholars, decorated military veterans and military service members. Others have completed significant work as EMTs and CNAs, spent time as teachers, and volunteered with numerous organizations such as The Red Cross, Habitat for Humanity, Global Brigades, and clinics, FQHCs, community outreach programs in the United States and abroad. All have demonstrated a deep commitment to medicine and to the characteristics Brown University values: humanism, service, compassion, and the intention to lead lives of purpose and integrity.
